	<p>Students in the Cosmetology Program and Esthetician Programs take the same test which is the Cosmetology & Barbering. So even though the college has 3 programs that have licensure passing rates (Nursing, Cosmetology, and Nursing) we only have two passing rates.</p> <p>With the release of the LaunchBoard data through doing what matters, the college is now using data from the LaunchBoard instead of using Perkins data, which was historically less reliable. However, there is a time lag in employment data, which is why the most recent year is not available for employment data.</p> <p>Although the College has about 736 (2014) to 707(2016) courses active in the Catalog, the College has only offered 541(2014) to 568(2016) of those courses in the last three academic years. If we are looking at assessment of courses offered, the College has an assessment rate of slightly over 90%. The College's curriculum committee recognizes the challenge of having courses active that are not assessed because they have not been offered and are continuing to work on suspending or retiring those courses.</p>
