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#### INTRODUCTION

The Golden West College (GWC) Fact Book is a reference manual containing data concerning the college's service area, students, faculty, staff, instructional programs and services. Data and analysis contained in this volume provide background information to facilitate policy analysis and decision-making. Intended audiences for this compendium are district managers, faculty and staff, as well as other interested educational institutions and the community served by GWC. The Office of Research, Planning, and Institutional Effectiveness (ORPIE) hopes that this book will be useful in analyzing information for evidence-based decision making in support of program review, strategic planning, and marketing.

The Department of Institutional Effectiveness compiled the information in this book using many different resources and database information centers. The primary sources for student data used in this publication include the Banner student data systems and MIS data that is reported to the California Community College Chancellor's Office. Other secondary data sources include U.S. Census and Data Mart from the Chancellor's Office. Differences in numbers between this and other documents may occur because of the particular criteria applied when the data are selected.

When a breakdown of a category includes a group called "Unknown," this group includes those who either left the category blank, or who marked "Unknown" or "Decline to State." The ethnic categories are those currently defined in the California Community Colleges' MIS Data Element Dictionary. The category Asian Pacific includes those who identify Asian, Pacific Islander or Filipino as their ethnic group.

## SECTION 1: Service Area and GWC Student Population

U.S. Census 2009-2013 American Community Survey 5-year estimates was used for Coast District Service Area data. Coast District Service Area: Costa Mesa, Fountain Valley, Garden Grove, Huntington Beach, Midway City, Newport Beach, Seal Beach, and Westminster.



The annual resident FTES has increased by 6% since its lowest year in 2012-2013 (Fig. 2.1).



Figure 3.1 Enrollment by Gender



Figure 3.2 Fal 2014 Student Educational Goals




Table 3.5 and Figure 3.2 indicates that 65.4% of GWC students, in fall 2014, expressed in their educational goal the desire to obtain an associate degree and/or transfer to a four-year university. Students categorized as those who enrolled in courses for personal/professional development are students who are taking courses to receive a vocational certificate, for career development, lifelong learning, basic skills development, complete high school diploma/GED or students who are taking courses at GWC while enrolled at another college.

Figure 4.1 Unduplicated Financial Aid Award Headcount



Figure 6.1 Transfer Volume




Figure 6.1 shows that transfer volume has fluctuated between 930 and 1,110 in the last four years. However, transfer volume was lowest in 2009-2010, at around 780, which can be related to the decline in admissions from the CSU system in the spring of 2010.




Figure 7.1 Golden West College Employee by Classification
