Overview of Program: The Golden West College Dance Program includes general education, education for an A.A. with a major in Dance curriculum, and transfer to upper division at colleges and universities. In a positive and creative environment, students are encouraged to develop their individual artistic identity along with a sense of the responsibility and discipline that is necessary for further study in a university or conservatory environment and a professional career. The program is designed to guide students as they develop individual strengths, acquire new skills, and discover hidden talents. The program and members of the faculty provide services to the campus and community in the form of public performances, master classes and workshops, fundraising, concert tours, adjudication, and significant outreach for the recruitment of new students.

Current State of the Program

Using the data offered, the following trend was noticed and the following conclusion formed:

SUCCESS RATE

- In the period 2008-2012, the Dance program enjoyed a 73% success rate for all students in all courses.
- Conclusion: A 73% success rate, while notable, leaves room for improvement. The Dance program will endeavor to upgrade the success rate in all courses.

3. What does your program do well?

The GWC Dance program, though small, does quite a few things well.

- Overall, the GWC Dance program has a much more personal approach than most community college dance programs with faculty, accompanists, and hourly teaching assistants going out of their way to help students become accomplished in dance, in dance technique and in performance.
- GWC dance students enjoy small classes with individual attention and after class coaching to meet their needs.
- GWC dance faculty members are very friendly and available to students for advisement.
- As stated earlier, course enrollments are under 25 students in most cases with dance students very committed to their courses
- The GWC Dance program offers over 25 courses covering a wide variety of dance styles.
- All the students have the opportunity to perform in the studio concerts each semester even if they are beginning students
- More advanced students have opportunities to perform in the theater dance concerts in the spring semester, work with professional guest artists and travel to festivals
- GWC dance students have opportunities to travel and perform in festivals within the U.S. and abroad
- Former students return often with words of great respect for the GWC Dance program and how it positively affected their lives
- GWC Dance program plays an active role in the community by presenting workshops, master classes and performances in the community at schools and special events, such as the GWC Invitational Dance Concert
- Professors from university dance departments have respect for the caliber of Dance program classes and performances, which affects their view of our students when they transfer to universities as dance majors
- The Dance program has had a live accompanist for one or two classes each year for many years, which
 is in line with university dance programs and prepares our students to work in an environment with live
 accompaniment

4. What are the challenges to your program?

Within your program's control

The GWC Dance program faculty needs to consistently review the following in order to invigorate program and course offerings:

- Programs and courses
- Grading
- Student learning outcomes
- Strategic planning
- Strategies to reduce early drop rate

Beyond your program's control

The GWC Dance program must continue to identify then hire additional faculty and add
additional class sections to accommodate the current volume of students as well as a high
volume of student we are seeking to join the program as majors. It is frustrating that there are
no additional sections or physical space to accommodate all who wish to join our program and
take the courses. To accommodate the current and future volume of students, we will continue

- to work with the college and the Arts and Letters division to provide more faculty, sections and opportunities for students interested in all aspects of dance performance and production.
- The GWC Dance program currently has one full time professor and one adjunct instructor per semester. Additional faculty is needed to sustain and grow the program.
- All the responsibilities of the program fall on one faculty member so the planning and introduction of new courses, new ideas or representation on college committees is extremely difficult
- The budget for the GWC Dance program has been reduced each year so the quality of the Dance program has been affected
- In order to produce concerts on stage, the GWC Dance program needs funds for designers, costumes, props and hourly wages for stage crew and additional personnel such as photographers, seamstresses, and videographers
- Currently, the GWC Dance program is expected to fully produce concerts with only 1/3 total funding as compared to previous years
- There needs to be new funding resources for the GWC Dance program either from the District, the college, the community, government or private grant programs
- Incoming high school students are untrained in dance because the local high schools do not offer comprehensive dance programs

5. What are the opportunities for your program?

The Golden West College Dance program needs additional new faculty to teach additional sections to maintain program vitality. Adding additional faculty teaching varied dance styles will increase job prospects for our students. Adding additional faculty along with continued growth in course enrollments and audiences will increase interest in the Dance program and productions and will be truly reflective of course goals, program goals and student learning outcomes.

6. Identified areas in need of improvement

- Breadth and volume of courses offered to accommodate student volume, course goals, program goals and student learning outcomes
- An additional full time faculty member and several part-time faculty members are needed for the program to grow and prosper
- Due to reduced operational funding at GWC in general and the Dance program in particular, many new pieces of equipment and facility maintenance is needed within the 2 dance studios facilities

<u>Staffing</u> What staff changes or additional employees does your program need to function adequately.

Faculty:

Full time Faculty Member – Dance with an emphasis in Modern, Jazz or Ballet and Choreography

- Well beyond the last ten years, the GWC Dance program has had one full time professor, (who is close to retiring) teaching courses that are in high demand and who is solely responsible for maintaining ongoing sequential courses for majors
- Currently, there is one (1) hourly instructor teaching one (1) of the over twenty-five (25) dance courses offered
- The ratio is not correct and the program cannot maintain a stable core of FT to PT ratio to provide a
 quality program or program growth
- The Dance program has been negatively impacted by the non-replacement of the full-time faculty position. The second full time position has been vacant for over 10 years
- There is barely sufficient full-time faculty to develop and maintain current curriculum for the program
- Students are not being served since current courses are at capacity resulting in students being turned away from enrolling in required courses
- An additional full time dance faculty member would
 - o Teach dance technique courses which are the mainstay of the Dance program
 - With additional sections, allow for students to enroll in required dance courses and not be turned away thereby relieving the current overload
 - Direct and choreograph concerts and representing the department on committees. At present, due to the schedule, the sole full-time professor cannot serve on committees and has no time to assist with program review or develop new courses.
 - Allow more cooperation with the Theater Arts and Music departments on their productions, providing them with excellent choreographers and thereby allowing the students to succeed to a higher level with cross discipline work
 - Prepare students for careers and employment in dance and performing arts
