Theater Arts

Please provide a brief description and any significant change in your program since the last Program Review cycle.

The Theater Arts Department provides opportunities to study the art and craft of theater. Students who enroll in degree or certificate programs prepare for transfer education and/or careers related to theatrical history and literature, performance, design/technology, and management. Theater Arts majors are introduced to theatrical history and literature, scenic, costume, lighting, projection, sound, and make-up design and technology, acting, directing, and management through coursework and production opportunities. Critical thinking and problem-solving skills are acquired through production assignments. Students are encouraged to develop academic and artistic skills enabling them to be successful in further study or employment.

There were two significant changes since the last Program Review cycle. The first is that through the PVR process, the CTE Certificate program for Scenic, Lighting and Projection Design Technician was deactivated. Students currently enrolled are finishing all courses to complete their certificates. No new students will begin the certificate program. No theater arts technical courses were affected by



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this decision.

The second change was that the department is nearly to full strength in regard to courses being offered, new and returning faculty on board, and increase in enrollment especially in on-campus, face-to-face courses.

What are your program's strengths? (Answers could include but not limited to KPI data)

The Theater Arts department is an award winning entity that does many things well. With course enrollments and audience attendance slowly returning to pre-pandemic levels, it is evident the department has been successful in meeting or exceeding its stated goals. The theater arts department encourages students of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities to participate in all areas of theater including lecture courses, acting, stage management, and backstage technical and design assignments. The department provides 50+ acting roles for student performers each season while offering students the unique opportunity to create and perform in two distinctive theatrical stage settings: the 326-seat Mainstage Theater and the 96-seat Stage West Theater. We maintain a vital presence in the community through outreach and social media.

What are the challenges for your program? (If there are regulations or requirements for your program that require additional support, please note those here)

The Theater Arts department recognizes the following challenges: 1. Rebuilding our enrollments including recruiting new theater arts majors and other students. 2. Rebuilding audience attendance. 3. Renovation of Stage West/Communications 108 into a safe theater lab space for acting classes, stage lighting and performances. 4. Hiring and paying for sufficient classified or part-time hourly staff to fill all positions required for the operation of the theater, productions, and the department. 5. Dealing with an aging classroom facility in the Mainstage Theater and theater building while continuing to seek funding from district and campus sources to repair and/replace aging equipment necessary to operate the building and to host college and community events and performances.

Describe any trends and contributing factors related to enrollment, retention, and success for this past cycle.

The theater arts department believes that restoring our strong paths to degrees and certificates including offering a full array of face-to-face courses and presenting challenging and innovative theatrical productions will stop the trend of lower student involvement and enrollment and improve efficiency. It has taken some time to regain our momentum from an 18-month lockdown, but we are seeing signs of improvement. We have received funding to have a part-time social media representative and are seeing good results in a short time. As long as the theater arts department remains visible and active, things will continue to improve.

The theater arts program is also in the process of creating a non-credit theater performance course to allow continuing participation in our theater productions for those students and community members



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who have exhausted all other enrollment options. It is hoped this non-credit course begins in Fall 2024.

How does your department/program support the goals of diversity, equity, inclusion, and accessibility? (Answers could include but not limited to gaps in success data, modality of course offerings, part/length of term (full-term, non full-term, etc.)

According to the data, the retention rate by academic year ending Spring 2022 including all courses, all credit status, all race/ethnicity and all gender is 93.4% and the success rate in the same period is 82.2%. In the past, Hispanic/Latinx, Male, Economically Disadvantaged, DSPS, Veteran, Foster Youth and CalWORKS students experienced slight disproportionate impact as compared to the total GWC student population simply because all students choose our courses rather than being required to take them. Latest data shows a Hispanic/Latinx retention rate of 92.0% which is up from the previous academic year and success rate of 77.5% which is down from the previous academic year total of 80.3%. Male students are showing a retention rate of 92.7% which is slightly down from the previous academic year and a success rate of 81.9% down from 84.8%. However, overall campus enrollment by male students is down as well.

The theater arts department and its courses are accessible for students who face physical or mental health challenges. Spacifically, all theater arts faculty have learned techniques and have adapted course procedures to accommodate students on the autism spectrum as we welcome those students each semester in many of our courses. It can be particularly challenging to welcome those students to work in acting, stage craft, or stage crew courses, so faculty and staff have worked diligently to find ways for those students to be successful. We did this by finding assignments that correspond to their strenghts. To date, all DSPS students have done really well in acting, stage craft and stage crew courses so much so that they return in following semesters.

We have no special activities planned to address the issue of students who are members of the disproportionately impacted group as the student population experiencing these challenges changes every semester. There is no consistency. We enforce the same rigor expected of all our students while providing kind counsel and academic mentoring. Our department will continue to welcome students from all student populations and continue to educate all who are willing to learn since all our students choose to enroll in Theater Arts courses to enhance their college experience and reach academic and artistic goals. In all courses, faculty will continue to stress basic learning skills and practices and continue to introduce and enforce professional level skills and goals as appropriate for Theater Arts study. The department has successfully strengthened our online-based lecture courses to allow all students to begin their theater arts studies while continuing to offer courses in acting, production or technical theater as face-to-face courses. Theater arts department faculty continues to be adaptable and resourceful, even in the most challenging of times.

How does your department/program collaborate with other areas on campus to advance student success?



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The theater arts department does not have any formal cohorts with other areas on campus. However, we consciously make an effort to create programming that will appeal to our allied disciplines on campus such as English, Art, World languages, and other departments to make both faculty and students aware of theatrical productions that relate to department studies. This creates many first-time theatrical experiences for students from other majors.

How does your department/program utilize technology to support student success?

Due to the nature of theater arts performance and production courses, we continue to stress face-toface course offerings in greater percentages than online courses. We have successfully expanded the number of lecture and design courses that can be delivered in an online modality. The faculty continues to ensure that a significant and diverse population of students participate in live performances and live technical theater opportunities in course work and in productions. Theater arts faculty are well-known in the theatrical community and continue to be adaptable and resourceful. Theater Arts students benefit from hands-on, face-to-face instruction.

The department also endeavors to purchase and use state-of-the-art theater technology whenever fiscally possible.

The trend has everything to do with the fact that 75% of our department's courses were locked down for 18-months resulting in a significant decrease in enrollment and face-to-face interaction with our students. We are now back to full face-2-face courses along with complete online offerings. Our students continue to successfully transfer. However, receiving a degree or certificate is not necessary for theater arts majors/students to transfer to a college, university or conservatory. Students have and will continue to successfully transfer based on their academic record, talent, skill demonstrations and/or technical theater acumen. Faculty will continue to advise students to enroll in these degree and certificate programs while stressing the value and importance of achieving a degree or certificate at the community college level.

As this remodel has been discussed, planned, priced and even scheduled to begin for several years as a campus facility/classroom improvement, the theater arts faculty will continue to urge the design and completion of the remodel and continue to provide design assistance in the hopes of having a safe, renovated space for all acting courses and most technical theater and production courses.

The Theater Arts Department provides opportunities to study the art and craft of theater including musical theater. Students who enroll indegree or certificate programs prepare for transfer education and/or careers related to theatrical history andliterature, performance, design/technology, and management. Theater Arts majors are introduced to theatricalhistory and literature, scenic, costume, lighting, projection, sound, and make-up design and technology, acting, directing, and management through coursework and production opportunities. Students are encouraged to develop academic and artistic skills enabling them to be successful in further study or employment. With strong course enrollments and audience attendance in periods prior to the Covid hiatus, it is evident the department has been successful in meeting or exceeding its stated goals. The theater arts department encourages students of all ages, backgrounds, and abilities to participate in all areas of theater including lecture courses, acting, stage management, and backstage technical and design assignments while providing 50-plus acting roles for student performers each season and offering students the unique opportunity to create and perform in two distinctive theatrical stage settings: the 326-seat Mainstage Theater and the 96-seat Stage West Theater. We maintain a vital presence in the community through outreach and social media.
