
EMERGENCY & BASIC NEEDS GRANTS

The Basic Needs Center provided \$292,035 in Emergency and Basic Needs Grants to 344 students during the 2023-24 Academic Year. These grants were awarded to students in need of financial support for essential expenses, including housing, childcare, basic living costs, transportation, technology, and unforeseen expenses that could affect their academic success.



Student Intakes: Case Management

The Basic Needs center served 233 student through case management services. These services help to address student needs for housing, clothing, hygiene items, and food. Students are connect to on and off campus resources.



CALWORKS

CalWORKs, or the (California Work Opportunity and Responsibility to Kids) is a statewide program which provides supportive services to parenting students enrolled at the community colleges; receiving county, cash-aid benefits; and are participating in STEP (Student Training and Education Program) with the County of Social Services Agency. The program is committed to assisting student-parents in achieving long-term self-sufficiency through a supportive, individualized approach that focuses on academic, career, and personal goals.







The Registration Rate is the percent of your voting-eligible students who registered to




The Voting Rate of Registered Students is the percent of registered students who voted on Election Day. We often refer to this as the "yield"





Counseling Drop-Ins: Total for 2023-2024 Academic Year 10,176












The Impact of Puente on Golden West College Students (2023/2024)



U.S. VETS Outside the Wire

Outside the Wire program is designed to provide comprehensive therapies and access to a strong network of qualified mental health professionals who can help veterans and their families manage the challenges a post-military transition can bring During the 2023-24 Academic Year, U.S. Vets Outside the Wire conducted:

- 12 Case Management sessions
- 46 Individual Therapy sessions
- 3 Mental Health/Destress Events
- 6 Outreach activities with 12 total attendees

Tutoring

The Veterans Resource Center provides free Math and English tutoring to all military connected students.

- In the 2023-24 academic year, the math tutor held 55 individual and group sessions with students who are taking courses ranging from Math 100, 115, 120, 160 and 170.
- In the 2023-24 academic year, the English tutor held 82 individual tutoring sessions. The Veterans English tutor assists students. The tutor specializes in essay formatting and grammatical review and assists with all courses.
